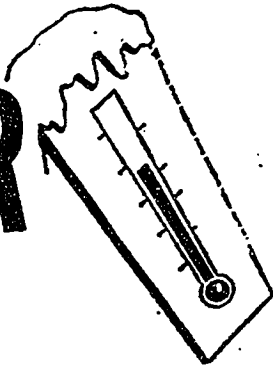

Dr. King To Address NAREB Conventioners

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., with equality of opportunity in will address delegates attending the 20th anniversary convention of the National Association of Real Estate Brokers, Inc., at the Fairmont Hotel in San Francisco, California.

The Convention is slated Aug. 6-11. Highlight of the convention will be the Annual Installation Banquet at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday night, Aug. 10, at the Fairmont.

Other activities will include a tentative Presidents' Dinner at which Dr. Robert C. Weaver is listed as tentative speaker, a Charter Day Luncheon, honoring those persons responsible for the founding of the National Association of Real Estate Brokers, Inc.

The activities and programs of the association over the past twenty years and the future program plans will be reviewed

Executive Director Leon Cox, Jr., said in Washington, "We are indeed fortunate to have Nobel Peace Prize winner, Dr. Martin Luther King, to speak at our convention, for we are all acutely aware of his concern

Cox added that the National Association of Real Estate Brokers will testify in behalf of the 1967 Civil Rights Bill before the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on August 29. He said that NAREB is vitally concerned with equality of opportunity in the housing market place and will continue to work for the passage of a comprehensive Civil Rights Bill with adequate housing provisions.

Enrollment Record Is Set By Chicago State College

Chicago State College has reached its admissions capacity and has, therefore, stopped admission of freshmen for the fall term, it was announced by Dr. Milton B. Byrd, president of the college.

Dr. Byrd said "I am pleased to announce that Chicago State College will have the largest freshman class in our history. Nearly 800 freshmen have been admitted to classes this coming September. I deeply regret, however, that we will not be able to accept additional entering freshmen. But, for the time being, we can accept some transfer students in the upper classes.

"Our staff, facilities, and budget have been stretched to every conceivable limit. We are adding nearly 70 new faculty members. Our present physical facilities are limited, and as a state-supported institution, we must operate within the budget approved by the legislature," he added.
